MARIA YELLOW HORSE BRAVE HEART, PhD



Dr. Maria Young Horse Brave Heart is an Associate Professor of Social Work at Columbia University. She developed historical trauma and historical unresolved grief theory and interventions among American Indians, which have become internationally recognized. In 1992, she founded the Takini Network, a non-profit organization devoted to community healing from Indigenous intergenerational massive group trauma. Dr. Brave Heart is expanding her work with reservation populations in the United States and Canada to include Indigenous and Mestizo populations from Latin America.
